Getting to Santa Fe

Flying into Santa Fe:

You can fly directly into Santa Fe via American Airlines or United Airlines. The City of Santa Fe website provides contact information for ground transportation to the [Eldorado Hotel & Spa](#) including car rental agencies, shuttle service, and cabs (http://www.santafenm.gov/ground_transportation_1).

Flying into Albuquerque:

Alternatively, and perhaps less expensive, you can fly into the Albuquerque International Sunport via most major airlines. The [Eldorado Hotel & Spa](#) is about 65 miles northeast of Albuquerque.

The [Albuquerque Sunport website](#) provides contact information for ground transportation to Santa Fe, including shuttle service (round trip from Albuquerque to Santa Fe is ~\$55 with Sandia Shuttle Service). Another inexpensive option is to take an Uber or cab to the train station and take the Rail Runner to Santa Fe. Full Railrunner fares are \$9 each way or \$4 each way with a valid student ID and can be bought online [here](#). You can walk from the train station (9 minute walk, 0.4 mile) to the hotel or take a cab.

About Santa Fe

Santa Fe was originally settled by Puebloan Native Americans with settlements dating between 1050 and 1150 CE. Between 1607 and 1610, Europeans began to settle the area with Santa Fe was declared the capital of New Mexico in 1610 by Governor Don Pedro de Peralta. A colorful history between Native Puebloans, Spanish soldiers, Franciscan missionaries, and other European settlers grew over the 300 years that followed. New Mexico joined the United States as its 47th state in 1912. Santa Fe is known for its unique New Mexican culture, incorporating Native American, Spanish, Mexican, and modern American ideas into the exquisite aesthetic that permeates all aspects of the city: art, architecture, music, food, and the landscape.

Surrounded by 12,000-13,000 foot mountains to the northeast, Santa Fe sits at an elevation of 7,198 feet. The Santa Fe Ski area is beautiful in the summer with many hiking trails in the surrounding area. Be prepared for cool, mountain evenings; warm to hot, sunny days; and possible afternoon rain showers (downpours, really). If you are not used to the elevation, be sure drink lots of water and don't forget your sunscreen—a must for any outdoor activities.

Take time to enjoy the pedestrian-friendly Plaza, the oldest part of Santa Fe, that is filled with galleries, restaurants, and shops. Dining options range from casual to upscale; reservations are recommended at higher end places. The conference hotel, the [Eldorado Hotel & Spa](#), is located about 2.5 blocks from the Plaza. Home of the renowned [Santa Fe Opera](#), performance do not start until the end of June. You may still be able to observe a dress rehearsal or simply tour the facilities.
